Financial Aid - Communication Notification

- OSFA Monthly Newsletter
 - Goes out at the end of every month and includes highlights of what SoM students need to be aware of, like filing the 2023-24 FAFSA
- On 4/7/23, M1 students were packaged and on 6/2/23, M2-M4 students were packaged for the 2023-24 Academic year
 - When packaged students received an email advising them of any next steps (<u>i.e.</u> turn in any verification documentation, accept offered loans, etc.)
 - Any time after we receive a student's FAFSA they can review Academica to see if any additional steps are needed
 - Weekly notifications go out to students who need to turn in any finaid documents

Financial Aid - Cost of Attendance (COA)

- How is the COA determined?
 - Budget survey every three years
 - Last one was in October 2022
 - Comparing to regional med school COA
 - For 2023-24 we compared WSU <u>SoM</u> to: UM, Wisconsin, OU, WMU, USC, Vanderbilt, and Johns Hopkins
 - Consumer Price Index (CPI) information
 - This is a measure of the average change overtime in prices paid by urban consumers from a market basket of consumer goods and services (from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics)



Financial Aid – Cost of Attendance (COA)

- Cost of Attendance (COA) or budget includes costs for the student only to complete their program of study
- COA is composed of:
 - Tuition/fees
 - Books/supplies (including laptop for M1 and exam costs M2/M3)
 - Room/board
 - Transportation (including residency interviews for M4)
 - Personal miscellaneous
 - Federal loan fees
- Cannot exceed COA with financial aid (grants, scholarships, loans, and/or work study)
- COA is determined yearly by the Office of Student Financial Aid (*Board of Governors determines tuition/fee amounts)

Nuance on the exact amount each student could receive

Question: In you experience do you feel in the last few years that the cost of attendance has been appropriately grown in relation to inflation/rising costs of living

This is where CPI and other indices would factor in. As of now we would say yes, as for example the survey stated that the cost of transport was lower than we were distributing, but we decided to keep it the same. We also recognize that prices and rents do change, but the payment is. We are kinda on the mark when we compare to other schools/regionally/CPI. We also can't have COA that's just open checkbooks. The Department of Spending has a list of what is appropriate to spend for/not, both for students and the general public. We also have to report debt level when you graduate. If that gets too high then Financial Aid/Department of Education/Other offices start coming in and asking questions. The COA payment is as reflective as we can be for the average cost of living as a Student, unfortunately not for the environment/other issues. This money is for you, the student. 2, is that the student comes in with a cost or expectation and that unfortunately is not in the formula. It's not the purchase/lease on a car, but things such as gas/occasional oil change

Question: Follow up on the survey, what was the response rate? Specifically among SOM

It was low, don't have the exact numbers but it's always been low especially versus the number of people in attendance. That's why this new relationship is beneficial for us both

Question: No one really remembers getting that email, and we're mostly curious about the exact numbers. But 25% were grad students "various", but would be curious about the exact numbers.

Question: This is about transportation specifically in relation to getting a vehicle. The SOM states that it is mandatory to have a vehicle to get to clerkship rotations. I would like the DOE to figure out ways to help get a

vehicle, even if that's with extra loans or other means to finance a car as a medical student. I had emailed the SOM and the email was along the lines of "you can take the leftover from your COA".

Our offices can work together to help solve this issue/communication. Just as you are held to boards, we are held to DOE. We just have to figure out how to work this out

Just to clarify one more thing. The DOE clarifies a lot of this, but do they have a dollar sign that is a max?

No, this is set by the institution. They do have certain categories that the institution can pay for, and then the institution has to figure out the exact amount. This is an average of budgets, and your personal budget may be

different, and it's not totally within the institution.

Unexpected Financial Hardships/Changes in Financial Situation

- Students complete a FAFSA every year they are intending to utilize Federal Aid.
- During the academic year students can speak with a Financial Aid Officer (FAO) about a Budget Adjustment Appeal
 - If approved, allows OSFA to adjust components of a students COA to create room for additional aid (loans, scholarships, grants, etc.).
 - Student educational related costs and appeals require supporting documentation
- Student can also reach out to Greg/Kelli to see if there are any emergency grants or scholarships available



We are allowed to do a budget request for extenuating circumstances. Now it's changed, pre covid was a lot of travel, now is zoom. So \$1000 usually covers it. But if it ends up being 2000 then we can add to the COA and then we can figure it out from there. So come talk to us, and we can figure out what areas we can help with

Question: What would have to happen to allow Wayne to offer free tuition

Above my pay grade, I can't answer that question. But I would agree, how do we fundraise or offer more assistance to allow more students to graduate without debt/

Now I know when NYU offered free tuition, how did this happen?

Mix of state and endowments? This can be as a mix of rich alumn or other factors for rich people

Loan Literacy Course / M4 Students

Emergency Scholarship for MD Students

- The Wayne State University School of Medicine Scholarship Committee has implemented a process for MD Students in emergency situations to apply for Emergency Scholarship Funds each Term. Fall 2023 Term will open soon
- To be eligible for consideration, the MD Student must 1) complete the APPLICATION and 2) SCHEDULE to meet with the Office of Scholarship, Debt Management and Financial Wellness to discuss their personal situation, create a budget, complete required Canvas Financial Wellness Modules, discuss available resources and create an improvement plan
- · MD Students must meet the following criteria:
 - Be Enrolled in coursework (MD Students on LOA are not eligible)
 - Completed a FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) for the Academic Year, if eligible to file a FAFSA and completed all Financial Aid requirements
 - If you are a non-citizen and not eligible to file a FAFSA you need to document what circumstances changed from the time
 you filed the Statement of Financial Support for Non-Residents
 - Funding cannot be awarded to cover Prior Academic Year Balances
 - Emergency Fund amounts are based on funding availability
 - Utilized all available Financial Aid funds including Federal Loans and a Federal Grad Plus Loan denial on file from any year
- The Scholarship Committee will grant the Emergency Scholarship Funds based on criteria and funds availability for the Term.


Only me, the other students are presenting but it's for the same project. This conference happened this past labor day weekend.



- Parking/rides was crazy last year due to downtown concert and game(s) at the same time.







Question: I'm not a dancer, but I'm a talker and was enjoying it and then had to move. Why?
